Paul finished second in his pool but had to forfeit his last two matches because of an injury.

"We bumped Colton up to the 152 lb class we he wrestled well but lost a couple of close matches; otherwise, he might have finished a little higher," McKenna said.

...slow start, leading Ewing at the end of the first quarter 12-11. The second period decided the game, with Osmond outscoring Ewing 26-0 as they cruised to a 65-26 victory.

"Our slow start Thursday night against Ewing didn't really concern me," Coach Schulze said.

"We hadn't had school the previous three days and hadn't seen the practice floor since the previous Thursday, so some rust was to be expected..."

Any bit of rust the Tigers may have had quickly disappeared in the second quarter, sparking a 41-4 run headed into the fourth quarter.

Osmond had an efficient night on offense, converting 53% of their shots, including a 5-for-12 performance from behind the three-point arc.

Osmond added 16 offensive rebounds to their effort Thursday, led by seniors Tucker Timmerman and Cole Moes, who combined for seven of them.

Three Tigers finished in double-figures. Brock had fifteen points; Cole added fourteen, and Alex Kumm (Jr.) scored eleven.

Keaton Timmerman (Fr.) was just out of reach, finishing with nine points on a perfect shooting night, going 4-for-4 from the floor and converting on his only free-throw.

"I was really happy with how we played against Bloomfield. We shared the ball on offense and forced several turnovers defensively," said Coach Todd Schulze.

The Tigers shot 49% from the floor and 71% from the charity stripe.

Brock Johnson and Cole Moes led the Tigers in scoring, earning sixteen and fifteen points respectively.

Cole dished out a team-high five of Osmond's seventeen assists in the game.

It was a solid teamvictory for the Tigers, with ten players scoring and eight handing out at least one assist.

"I thought our bench really played well for us in this game, in particular Brett Simmons and Kyle Swallow, who combined for fourteen points, four rebounds, and two assists," added Schulze.

The Tigers shot 16-for-43 (37%) overall, their best performance in several games.

Andrea Schmit (Jr., G/F) also had a nice game. Not only did she score seven points, but she had nine rebounds, three steals, and two assists.

In the post, Shelby Aschoff played one of her best games of the year. She had seven rebounds and was aggressive.

Makenzie Johnson (So., F) had a couple really nice assists early in the game. She also had five rebounds.

Kelly Schuettler (Jr., F) and Kendyl Koehler (Sr., F) both helped the Tigers on the glass. Schuettler had seven rebounds and Koehler added three.
