BY MR. SCHULZE LAUREL—The Osmond boys basketball team ended their season Tuesday, February 21 with a tough loss against...

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...Randolph (45-42) in the Laurel-Concord-Coleridge gym.

Both teams played great defense throughout the game, making each other convert difficult shots on the offensive end.

The Tigers led by five points at the end of the first quarter and were about to go into halftime with the lead until Randolph's Merrix Denn knocked down a three-pointer moments before the buzzer sounded to give the Cardinals the 28-27 halftime lead.

"I was comfortable with how we played in the first half, forcing the tempo, and getting good looks in transition as well as in our half-court offense," Tigers Head Coach Todd Schulze said.

The second half was played at a much slower pace, with each team scoring only seven points in the third quarter, capped at the buzzer by another Denn 3-pointer.

The two teams went back and forth in the fourth quarter with each team having to grind out offensive possessions.

Down 45-42 with :08 left in the game, the Tigers attempted an out-of-bounds play to get a shot to tie the game; the Tigers did get a shot, but it missed the mark.

"For me this seasonending loss stung more than they have in the past. Calling that timeout with :08 left on the clock, and watching Alex Kumm bury the game-tying three-point shot shortly after the official blew his whistle was tough for me and our team to handle," Schulze said.

The season certainly didn't end the way the Tigers would have hoped, but it is still one they can be proud of.

Osmond basketball program says goodbye to seniors Blake Aschoff, Brock Johnson, Bryan Manzer, Cole Moes, Brett Simmons, Kyle Swallow, Tucker Timmerman, and Tyler vonRentzell.

"The last four years with these guys have been an absolute blast. I thank those guys for all the positive contributions they have made to our school and basketball program over the last four years," Schulze added.

"Paul's last match was against a quality (wrestler) that (he) had beaten earlier in the year but (the match) just didn't go our way this time," McKenna said.

Paul had a great season and finished with a record of 25-13.

Gubbels qualifies for second consecutive State Meet

The Tigers scored eleven points and finished in seventeenth place.

Plainview was the team champion, followed by Creighton and Southwest.

Paul Gubbels, wrestling at 138 lbs, finished in fourth place and qualified for the state tournament.

Paul started off the tournament with a pin over Teran Sharman (Palmer) in the first round.

In the championship quarterfinals Paul won a thrilling come from behind 7-6 decision over Derek Wortman of Creighton to make it to the semi-finals.

"Paul had a big quarterfinals match in which he fell behind early but came back to score six points in the final minute of action to pull out an important 7-6 decision," Tigers Head Coach Larry McKenna said.

In the semi-final round Paul lost by pin to three-time state champion Christian Miller of Plainview.

Paul then came back to...

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...win his next match with a close 4-2 win over James Polen (North Central) to make it into the medal rounds.

In the third and fourth place match, Paul forfeited to Derek Wortman (Creighton) to finish in fourth place and qualify for state.

"Paul had a great tournament," McKenna said. "We knew coming in that he would have to wrestle well to place in the top four and qualify for state."

Cardinals outlast Tigers in Sub-District Play

LAUREL—The Osmond Tigers played one their best games of the year on Tuesday, February 14 in their D1-5 Sub-District Opening Round game against the Randolph Cardinals in Laurel.

The Tigers held a 13-12 lead just before half-time, and,

despite allowing the Cardinals to climb to an 11point lead at one point, they had cut the lead to four points near the game's end.

"The girls gave a supreme effort and fought to the very end," Tigers' Head Coach Michael Brown said.

The Cardinals ended up winning the game 45-37 to advance to the D1-5 Sub-District Finals against Bloomfield.

Ultimately the game came down to the Cardinals' solid free-throw shooting (21-for-30, 70%) and early missed shots by the Tigers.

The Tigers finished the night 14-for-57 (25%) shooting, including four three-pointers.

The Tigers didn't really get their offense going until the second quarter.

Down 6-2 after the first quarter, the Tigers rebounded in the second quarter with 11 points.

However, the third quarter was not kind to them as Randolph outscored them... ...15-7 to take a 29-20 lead into the fourth quarter.

The Tigers outscored the Cardinals 17-16 in the fourth quarter, including the run that got them within four points of the lead.

Osmond's twenty-four fouls were a big factor in the game. While it's granted that they needed to foul in the game's waning minutes to stop the clock, the Tigers third quarter fouling was costly.

There were at least two specific situations where a Randolph post was fouled in the act of shooting and making a basket.

Comparatively speaking, the Tigers did a decent job of taking care of the ball.

They had 19 turnovers, though much of the game they felt full-court pressure. (Randolph had 19 as well.)

The Tigers held a 32-28 rebounding advantage, which included 13 offensive rebounds.

Offensively, the Tigers had seven scorers. Leading the way was junior Andrea Schmit with thirteen points.

She hit both threepointers she attempted. She also added a team-high nine rebounds.

Makenzie Johnson (So., F) notched six points on just six shots. She added four rebounds and a block.

Alex Brestel (Fr., G)...

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...had an efficient night off the bench. She scored five points on five shots, including a big three-pointer late in the game.

Despite being her team's main source of offensive production throughout the year, Caitlin Kumm (Sr., G) had just five points. However, Kumm's value was irreplaceable in other areas.

She proved vital in dribbling through the Cardinals' pressure and in distributing the ball to her teammates (three assists).

Kumm also had five rebounds and three steals.

Kelly Schuettler (Jr., F) had one of her best games of the season.

She scored four points, but was valuable in her rebounding and presence in the paint. (She scored two points off a big offensive rebound.)

Mariah Stech (So., G) and Emily Bolz (So., G) each scored two points.

Seniors Shelby Aschoff (Sr., F) and Kendyl Koehler (Sr., F) both contributed in their final game as Tigers.

Bailee Gillespie (Sr., G) did not play due to a recurring knee injury.

Shelby Stelling (Jr., F) spelled forwards throughout the night; she came in the game late to foul.

The Tigers season came to a close at 5-15. Their

five wins came against Plainview, Creighton, Allen, Neligh-Oakdale, and Winside.

They got off to their best start (3-4) in four seasons, but had a difficult time in the second semester (2-11).

"This team might not have had the most wins the last few years, but the progress they've made as basketball player and, more importantly, as young ladies of character will last them a lifetime," Brown added.

While the Tigers shot slightly better than their opponents at the free-throw line, they allowed their opponents to shoot nearly 200 more free-throws than they got to shoot.

(They had 427 total fouls compared to their opponents' 313 fouls.)

Their opponents ultimately outscored them by 85 points at the line (Osmond 198-372 53%, Opponents 282-548 52%).

The Tigers' opponents scored fourteen points per game off free-throws, which is tough to swallow considering Osmond was outscored by opponents by an average of six points per game (45 points against per game vs. 39 points scored per game)

Kumm was the team's best free-throw shooter (63-96, 66%).

She averaged over three points per game from the free-throw line. (Overall, she scored 12.2 points per game.)

Andrea Schmit was 44for-82 from the line (54%). Percentage-wise, Koehler was the team's best free-throw shooter (13-for-18, 72%).

Although poor shooting seemed to be a thorn in the Tigers' side throughout the year, their opponents were only able to score eighteen more baskets than them over the course of the season (Osmond 266-1,103 24%, Opponents 284-892 32%).

Johnson was the team's most efficient shooter. She was 35-for-119 (30%) from the field. While she didn't take many shot per game, Emily Bolz hit 30% of her shots.

Turnovers were a bit of a hindrance for the Tigers who had 402 compared to their opponents' 377.

The bright spot for the Tigers was rebounding. They out-rebounded their opponents by nearly 100 rebounds (Osmond 709, opponents 611).

Schmit (136) and...

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...Schuettler (126) were the team's better rebounders. The Tigers did have four girls who averaged over five rebounds per game.

Kumm had 67 steals; No other Tiger had more than 26 (Johnson).

The Tigers say "goodbye" to Aschoff, Gillespie, and Koehler; thanks to you for all of your hard work!

"I was so proud of our girls this year...," Brown finished.

NORFOLK—On Tuesday, January 31st, 2017 five Osmond FFA members traveled to the Northeast Community College Agriculture Complex to compete in the District 4 Livestock Judging Contest.

Students were asked to judge eight different classes of livestock, including breeding ewes, breeding heifers, market lambs, market steers, two classes of market hogs, cull/keep gilts, and cull/keep heifers.

They also completed a test based on various livestock knowledge and practiced their speaking skills by giving oral reasons.

Competing in the junior division and qualifying for the state competition in April were freshmen Zach Alderson, Landon Stelling, Madeline Huwaldt, and Josh Gansebom.
