The Tigers all ran well with some season's best times recorded. Top finishers were Jared Bessmer and Johnson Chishiba who placed tenth and twelfth respectively.

Any runners placing in the top fifteen qualify for the State meet in Kearney.

Jared's time was 18:00.65 and Johnson was clocked at 18:22.04.

The next Tiger runner was Aaron Chishiba coming in thirty-seventh place in 19:49.40.

Johnson was clocked at 5:34 and was in thirtysixth place.

Positioning of the runners changes a lot between the first and second mile. Jared had fallen back to fifty-fifth place and Johnson sixty-second place.

The final mile is where runners set themselves up for the kick to the finish. Again runners pass each other and are passed.

Jared ran past a runner from Filmore Central on his way to the finish line. He finished in sixtieth place in a time of 18:55.1.

Johnson was closing on two runners, one from BRLD and the other from Paxton all while staying ahead of Sutherland and Red Cloud/Blue Hill. He placed seventy-first in a time of 19:11.1.

"Both Jared and Johnson ran well in the large quality field" praised Coach Joe Ortmeier. "They got out well, maintained their pace and gave it all on the way to the finish. I'm very proud of both of them."

The Tigers graduate two seniors Ethan Pfanstiel and Alex Kumm, but return most of the boys team and all of the girls.

### Football team wins home finale

The Osmond Tigers football team went into Thursday, October 19's District D2-5 game against the O'Neill-St. Mary's Cardinals knowing that they essentially must-win to gain entry into the 2017 State Playoffs.

They used a 42-12 performance against the Cardinals to do just that.

The Tigers scored a season-high forty-two points while preventing the Cardinals from scoring until the waning moments of the third quarter.

"Tonight was a good night for our team," Tigers Head Coach Scott Morrison said. "Our team played with emotion and heart tonight."

Despite struggling with penalties at times, the Tigers played as close to their peak as they had so far in the season.

Defensively, the Tigers held the Cardinals below eight yards on all but two plays (a 67-yard run by Grady Semin and a 15-yard draw by Jared Winkelbauer).

Offensively, eight different Tigers touched the ball. And, running behind solid blocking, produced just over 400 yards.

The Tigers scored twice in the first half to build a 14-0 lead headed into halftime. Senior back Colton Beacom scored the first of his four rushing touchdowns on a 27-yard run on OHS's opening drive.

Anthony Heiman (Jr., B) made it a two-score game in the second quarter on a 30-yard run.

Both Heiman and Beacom benefited from some solid blocking up front. Drew Krienert (Sr., E/DE), Alex Alderson (Sr., OL/DL), Nick Reikofski (Jr., OL/LB), Alexis Solorzano (So., OL/LB), and Zach Huwaldt (Fr., E/DL) paved the way for them all night.

"Our line played well throughout the night," Morrison said. "From the opening play, we were physical and aggressive. If our players didn't have the ball, they hit someone trying to get to it.

The Tigers built the lead progressively through the third quarter. They racked up twenty-two points in the quarter, starting with a 52-yard touchdown run by Beacom on the second half's opening play from scrimmage.

After they made it 28-0, the Tigers let up their biggest play of the game—the 67-yard run by Semin. But, after punting the ball back to the Cardinals on their ensuing possession, the Tigers struck quickly.

...and returned it 47 yards for a score. (Heiman was escorted by Solorzano into the end zone.)

This gave the Tigers a 36-8 lead.

The Cardinals did not go away, however. In fact, they recovered the Tigers' lone fumble of the night, which gave them a short field to go in for their second and final touchdown of the night.

Winkelbauer scored from three yards away to make it 36-14.

The Tigers capped their performance with a lengthy drive that saw Beacom score on a tough run to the outside.

Senior quarterback
Brenden Hille made a nice
play on third-and-short as he
snuck the ball up the middle
for a first down to extend the
drive while it was still in Tiger
territory.

Sophomore quarterback/wide receiver Justus Maertins had a decleater block late in the third quarter. Landon Stelling (So., OL/DL) saw several snaps as a guard.

Defensively, several Tigers had great games. This started up front with the line where Drew Krienert had a great return in his first game back from injury. Early in the game he sniffed out a screen on fourth down and stopped it for a loss.

"Our seniors stepped up for us throughout the night," Morrison said. "I wish we could have them for another season!"

Reikofski had one of his best games of his season so far. He did a great job staying free from linemen and put good licks on Cardinal backs throughout the night.

Solorzano and Beacom played solid games for the Tigers. Solorzano seemed to be in on nearly every tackle, while Beacom was consistent facing both the run and pass.

Zach Huwaldt was moving defensively much of the night. He found himself in the backfield much of the night, and he also seemed in on multiple tackles.

Maertins had a great game at safety. Not only did he intercept a pass, but he knocked down two big passes.

Asher Wattier made a big tackle in the fourth quarter. Hille had a nice pass deflection.

"The great part about our defensive performance tonight was having what seemed like everybody contribute in a big way," Morrison said. "Even on simple run plays we had four or five guys to the ball."

The Tigers' younger players came on the field for a series defensively and offensively.

Louis Muschter (Sr., E/DL) made a nice tackle

alongside teammate Alex Palu. Graysen Schultze (Fr., B/DB) came up and made a nice hit on a ball-carrier.

Landon Stelling and Parker Johnson worked in as linebackers. Connor Gutz (Fr., B/OLB) and Josh Gansebom (So., B/OLB) both got in on a couple plays. Gansebom made two tackles.

Logan Stelling (So., OL/DL) jumped into play as a defensive line. So too did Zach Boyle (Fr.) and Blake Bahr (Fr., OL/DL).
