KEARNEY — Friday, October 21st was the annual running of the Nebraska Class D State Cross Country meet in Kearney at the Kearney Country Club.

The temperature was in the 60 but rather breezy as the 148 Class D boys toed the starting line.

Osmond's sophomore Jared Bessmer was among the mass of runners heading down the hill to the first turn.

Jared hit the first mile in the middle of the pack with a time of 5:45.

He was thirty seconds behind the leader. The young Tiger had never started with this many runners or had a large group around in the middle of the 5K run.

"This was completely different than any race Jared had ever run in," noted Coach Ortmeier. "Usually after a short distance, the pack thinned out to five or six runners but not at State."

At the finish, Jared placed 88th place in a time of 19:14.2.

"Jared was pretty disappointed in his race, but it

...accomplishment to qualify," Ortmeier said. "We can build on this for next year."

This was the first time the court was in session outside of the Lincoln and Omaha area.

According to Mrs. Janet Brown, 7th-12th history instructor, "This was a fantastic educational opportunity for our students and allowed the students to see first-hand how our Nebraska judicial system works at the highest level."

Landon Stelling a ninth grade civics student stated, "I thought it was a good experience for us because (we) never knew how much work, effort, and research (a person) had to put into these kinds of jobs, like being on the Supreme Court."

Another ninth grade civics student, Ashley Wingert, had this to say about

the morning, "I think getting to go to the Supreme court hearing was a great opportunity. It allowed students to know what it is like to be in a court hearing. It also allowed us to get an idea too, if we want to get a job in law".

The session came to a close as the students were allowed to ask questions of the Supreme Court justices about their careers, day-to-day activities, and the different types of cases they hear.

The fourth, fifth, and sixth graders were divided into teams of five. Then they participated in a relay race where they had to unwrap a piece of candy, chew it and then go back to the line. They were timed while doing this.

During the second round, the activity was repeated; however, each student had to wear a glove while they unwrapped the candy. Time was recorded again.

In the third round of the relay, each student wore two gloves and tried to unwrap the candy. The three times were compared to see how quickly each team accomplished the task in each round.

A big difference was noted in the times indicating a definite impairment of the motor skills comparable to being "under the influence."

The second activity that the FBLA members worked with the students on was to have each student write down a saying showing their desire to stay "drug free".

These sayings were written on slips of paper and

then linked together to form a chain.

The chain was displayed in the Multi-Purpose Room showing that each student supported another. Students also signed a poster saying that they wanted to stay healthy.

FFA National Convention

INDIANAPOLIS, IN—The 89th National FFA Convention and Expo was held October 19-22 in Indianapolis, Indiana.

More than 60,000 FFA members and guests from throughout the United States, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands attended this year's event.

Alex Alderson of the Osmond FFA Chapter traveled to Indianapolis with Mrs. Evans and students and advisors from Creighton, Verdigre, Madison, and Blair.

Convention and expo events took place at several venues in downtown Indianapolis and other locations.

Alex, along with more than 50,000 other FFA members and advisors met in Bankers Life Fieldhouse—where eight of the nine general sessions were held, for opening session 1C.

At the opening session, the National Officer Team called for FFA members to "Transform Purpose to Action"—the theme of this year's convention.

"FFA members transform their purpose into action by making their voices heard and by educating others on the importance of agriculture and growing our resources every day," 2015-16 National FFA President Taylor McNeel, a student at Southern Arkansas University, said.

"During the convention and expo, we can learn from one another how we can continue to grow leaders, strengthen

agriculture and build our communities."

During the opening session keynote speaker Diana Nyad spoke on the importance of never giving up on your dreams and staying focused no matter what life throws your way.

Nyad was the first person confirmed to have ever swam from Havana, Cuba to Key West, Florida without the aid of a shark tank.

The trip was a grueling 110-miles and took her 53 hours to complete. Nyad was 64 years-old when she reached her goal.

At the Indiana Convention Center, Alex explored the expo and expanded his knowledge by attending a variety of workshops.

Alex also participated in several educational and career success tours on the trip, including a tour of the Wood Mizer (portable sawmill) blade factory, the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, the Purdue University Genetics Laboratory, Fair Oaks Dairy Farm, and an Amish community.

On the morning of Saturday, Oct. 22, the eighth general session was held in Lucas Oil Stadium where American FFA Degrees, the highest degree for an FFA member, were bestowed upon more than 3,000 members....

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....One hundred and forty seven FFA members from Nebraska received their American degrees at the Ceremony including Cassidy Curtis and Jocelyn Sukup of the Creighton FFA Chapter, Stephanie Sorensen of the Plainview FFA Chapter, and Kaitlyn Hanvey of the Verdigre FFA Chapter.

The 90th National FFA Convention will be held in Indianapolis on October 25-28, 2017.

The Osmond Tigers hosted the state-rated Bloomfield Bees for the Tigers Parents' Night festivities.

Unfortunately for the Tigers, they fell to the visiting Bees by a 60-30 score.

The Bees got on the scoreboard on their first drive with a seven-yard run off the left side of their offensive line. The conversion try was stopped.

The Tigers were unable to muster a scoring drive on their first possession and had to punt to the Bees.

The Tigers' defense rose to the occasion on the Bees' second possession and forced a punt which was 'shanked' giving the Tigers excellent field position.

Although the Tigers reached scoring position, the drive stalled, and Alexis Solorzano put the Tigers on the board with a 26-yard field goal. The first quarter ended with score 6-3.

The Bees scored on the first play of the second quarter on a one-yard plunge and added the conversion with a run.

The next two Tiger possessions saw the opportunistic Bloomfield defense take advantage of Tiger miscues.

The first, a fumble recovery, led to a short touchdown drive to extend their lead to 22-3 after the conversion run.

The second, an interception return for a touchdown, and subsequent two-point conversion pass saw the Bees take a commanding 30-3 lead

midway through the second quarter.

However, the Tigers fought back in the second half of the quarter, scoring twice.

The first came on a 14-yard touchdown pass from Brock Johnson to Bryan Manzer. Alexis added the PAT kick to close to 30-10.

Late in the second quarter, the Tiger defense held the Bees on a fourth down deep in the Bees' end of the field, and the offense made them pay as Brock Johnson hit Curtis Kralicek from 17 yards out with 37 seconds left in the half.

The Solorzano PAT kick closed the gap to 30-17 at the half.

The Tigers took the second half kickoff and drove quickly for a score. The drive started with a solid kick return that put the Tigers in business near the midfield stripe.

The drive was culminated with a 30-yard run by Brock Johnson. Although the Tigers missed the PAT, they had closed to 30-23.

The Tigers were quickly back in business after stopping the Bees on their next possession and, forcing a punt, the Tigers drove down to inside the Bees' 10-yard line. But were unable to punch it in and a field goal attempt was no good.

NORFOLK—The Osmond cross country team traveled to Norfolk for the District D-2 meet held at Skyview Lake on Thursday, October 13th. The weather was cool and breezy, perfect for running.

Eighty-six runners were lined up in the starting

boxes. The Tigers all got out well—especially Jared Bessmer who got in the top ten early.

He worked his way up to fourth place in the middle of the race before fifth place on the final turn.

He was out-leaned by two Norfolk Catholic runners and finished in seventh place qualifying him for next the state meet. His time was 18:04.96.

Aaron Chishiba finished in 34th place in a nice time of 20:02.65. Paul Gubbels finished in 39th place after passing two Stanton runners in the last 100 meters. His time was 20:27.57.

Ethan Pfanstiel came in at 44th place closing in on a runner from Winside. Ethan's time was 20:47.72, his second fastest time of the season.

Kyle Swallow finished in 21:46.56 for 62nd place and Alex Kumm placed 78th in a time of 24:34.33.

When the final scores were tallied, the Tigers had finished in sixth place—just two points from fifth in the fifteen-team field.
